Eastern Suburbs – full-back, E Rigney; three-quarters, G Wright, L Steel, J Dawson, E Connerton; half-backs, H Caples, S Kaufman; forwards, W Ives, T Molloy, H Holmes, A Oxford, W Richards, J Watkins

Western Suburbs – Full-back, F McMillan; three-quarters, W Collins, N Matterson, G Stettler, F Yanz; half-backs, A Mendel, E Doig; forwards, E Courtney, C W Prentice, E Stapleton, J Drew, L Yanz, H J Leddy Referee: W Neill

For a few minutes play was in neutral territory. ... Western Suburbs' forwards toed it on, and Drew, picking up, dashed over for a try. Stettler failed at goal, and Western Suburbs led by 3 to nil. Eastern Suburbs were awarded a penalty, and from near half-way Oxford kicked a great goal, making the scores; Western Suburbs 3, Eastern Suburbs 2. Shortly after the kick-out Steel followed up his kick, and bustled McMillan who dropped the ball. Ives was handy, and, gathering it in, scored in a good position. Oxford converted, and Eastern Suburbs led by 7 points to 3. The game was fast and open. Western Suburbs were attacking when Kaufman secured from the scrum; he sent it to Caples, who passed to Wright, and the latter, cutting in, sent it on to Steel, who got over the line. It was the best try of the day. Oxford again converted and his side led by 12 to 3. Kaufman now retired and Crowell took his place. Western Suburbs forwards carried play to Eastern Suburbs territory, and Leddy, picking up, scored a try, which Stettler converted, making the scores – Eastern Suburbs 12, Western Suburbs 8. Just before half-time Doig secured, and, running through the ruck, scored a try, which Stettler failed to convert. Eastern Suburbs 12, Western Suburbs 11.

Western Suburbs attacked immediately... Then Stettler, who was playing well, cross-kicked, and Collins, beating Connerton for the ball, scored a try. Stettler missed the goal, and Western Suburbs led by 14 to 12. With the scores so close, the game became very fast and open. Eastern Suburbs were awarded a penalty, and from outside the 25 Oxford kicked a great goal, and made the scores level. Connerton fielded the ball, but Matterson intercepted, cut through, and scored under the bar, for Stettler to kick an easy goal, making the scores Western Suburbs 19, Eastern Suburbs 14. Eastern Suburbs made desperate efforts to even the scores but their opponents were now playing great football, and their defence was equal to every demand. (The Sydney Morning Herald 28th May 1923)

Full-back McMillan played very fine football for Wests. The centres – Stettler and Matterson – were also excellent. The whole of the backs were nippy, quick in getting to the man, and tackled solidly. The Western forwards were in a good form as a team, with every man doing his share, and the combination sound. It is astonishing how the veterans, such as Leddy and Courtney, continue to keep their form and rival the younger men. (Referee 30th May 1923)

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Notes: This was an upset and a very strong win by Wests. Most of the commentaries highlighted the form of the forwards and particularly the continuing form of the evergreens, Tedda Courtney, Clarrie Prentice and Harold Leddy. There was also a strong write-up in <u>Rugby League News</u> on the fine form of Gordon Stettler. He had speed to burn.
