### Match Description

**Western Suburbs.**— Patterson, full-back; Feeney, Barclay, McFayden and Baldock, three-quarters; McEvoy and Alderson, halves; Mead Stack, Healy, McDonald, Dowsall and Perry, forwards  
**Newtown**— W Neill, full-back; C Russell, F Munnery, A Hawkes, E Williams, three-quarters; F Gressler and W Hayes, halves; J Murray, J Mogan, A Burdett, T J Barnett, D Grundle, and W Noble (c), forwards **Mr E Shaw, Referee**

At Metters' Sports Ground, Newtown had what may be termed a practice outing with Western Suburbs, the clubs holding highest and lowest positions in the competition. About 1000 were present.

Newtown ran up 23 points to nil in the first half, Williams (2), Burdett (2) and Mogan getting tries, and Hayes three goals and Russell one. Hawkes, Noble and Grundle added tries in the second half, Mogan landing one goal. Stack and Perry scored a try each for Western Suburbs. Newtown were not represented by their strongest side, and in the second half did not over-exert themselves. Mr Shaw, referee. **(Sunday Times 4th September 1910)**

Wests have a lot of young players who play the game clean and are as game as they make them, but what they seriously need is a couple of old hands to keep them together or sharpen up their weak points. **(Sportsman 7th September 1910)**
