Frank Stanmore, Western Suburbs five-eighth played for 70 minutes with a possible fracture of the right arm when his team beat Newtown 17-11 in the Rugby League game at the Cricket Ground, yesterday. The win, which was in doubt until the last minute, gave Wests its first club championship. After the game, Stanmore, who was in considerable pain, had his forearm padded and then strapped with adhesive tape. An X-ray tomorrow will show whether he has a fracture or a very bad bruise. Stanmore said the arm ached from the first 10 minutes, when he was struck by a boot. He will be hard to replace if unavailable next Saturday when Wests plays the first semi-final against Balmain. In an exciting finish Newtown gained a one-point lead, 11-10, and then lost it when Billy Keato kicked a magnificent goal from a yard inside halfway. Each side scored three tries, but Wests made more of its chances. Handling blemishes spoilt Newtown's game. Wests played solid football and no player in the back division could be classed as a star. Wests' outstanding forwards were Hansen and Horder, each of whom played robust football, crashing ahead with the ball and testing the defence every time they gained possession. They scored two of the three tries gained by Wests, Horder going through Kennerson's tackle by sheer determination. Hansen, who scored the first try, made full use of his weight to force his way over. Both these forwards are non-stop workers and by playing cleanly they seldom give away a penalty. Smith played well for Newtown, starting the move that resulted in Jacobson's try. He gathered a ball which Stanmore tossed behind him and sent Jacobson away on a brilliant run. Jacobson also handled in the move which ended when Kennerson came up on the outside to score after every Newtown back had the ball. (The Sun 22nd August 1948)

Jack has proved a great asset to Wests, not only as a player but also as a leader...Congratulations to Billy Keato on that grand goal last Saturday from just on halfway which gave us the lead when things were just beginning to look grim...Col Hudson has had a rapid rise in football. Previous to coming to us he played in the Army, at the start of the season was graded in our thirds, and today is playing with the firsts in the semi-final...Nev Hogan is now playing the best football of his career. Nev has one great asset. He is as tough as any half we have seen and the harder the going the better he likes it. (Rugby League News 28th August 1948)

Frank Stanmore played on with a possible fractured arm suffered early in the match and Jack Lackey came in for Pat Leal who had a bruised shin. The match was 5-all at half-time and still in doubt until the final five minutes when Keato kicked a magnificent goal from half-way to hit the lead and then Bennett scored a match-winning try. It gave Wests the Club Championship for the first time as well as, of course, being Minor Premiers.
