#### **Match Description**

Five thousand spectators saw Western Suburbs register their fourth successive win against their neighbours, St. George, at Earl Park. The margin of I8 to 3 is by no means a true reflection of the merits of the teams. On the day had the visitors displayed a little more cohesion, and a better understanding amongst the backs, the margin at the close would have been considerably reduced. On innumerable occasions when the defence was pierced, injudicious tactics nullified these dangerous incursions. Three of the four tries registered by the locals were from purely individual efforts that started from their own side of halfway. Territorially, the losers monopolised the situation, and it was only on rare occasions that the locals were able to hem their opponents in. While West's display was unimpressive, St. George displayed surprisingly improved form In the first term, against a stiff breeze, the Black and Whites registered two tries and goals to a penalty try. Big winger Morris, who gave a magnificent display, started the movement for the first try. Cutting infield, he at once 'cut out' half a dozen defenders, and then, clapping on the pace, he sent to Craig, to Matterson, to Brady, who ran over in the corner. With a clinking kick from the touch line, Craig raised the flags. McCormack was awarded the next score, after receiving interference from McMillan, following a clever run and short punt, that beat the former, but who held McCormack. Pierce cut through brilliantly, to leave the opposition standing, after Craig and Johnson had handled, and ran in under the posts, for Craig to goal.

Western Suburbs, displaying the necessary finish when opportunity presented itself, were able to score two more tries on changing ends. The second one was the best, of the day. McMillan fielded a kick at halfway, and raced to the open side before sending to Matterson. The latter went straight, for ten yards, before transferring to Pearce, who sent to Sherwood, on to Morris, who cleverly propped, to scoot infield, and, brushing off a couple of opponents, finalised a spectacular movement. McCormack, Saints' custodian, was the best back on the ground. He made his redoubtable opponent, McMillan, look a novice. His catching was uncanny, while his kicking was faultless. In addition to scoring a well-earned penalty try, he saved two by deadly tackling. McMillan, on the other hand, was patchy, and too spectacular. Pearce and Morris both displayed exceptional initiative and resource. Craig was a trifle slow and uncertain in attack, but was sound in defence. Matterson displayed great dash and 'football brains' as lock forward for the winners. Brogan and Cornwell were the best of the remainder.....
