Western Suburbs beat North Sydney in a highly spectacular and crowd-pleasing game 35 points to 24 before an enthusiastic crowd of 5733 at Pratten Park, in a score of seven tries and seven goals, to six tries and three goals. Darcy Russell's unerring accuracy with the boot was a contributing factor in Wests' win. Naturally, defence was conspicuous by its absence, both teams giving the ball the air, with tries coming alternately to each team throughout the game. Nevertheless, the local lads always had the drop on their opponents, and never looked like losing. Kangaroo winger Ken Irvine stole the thunder despite his team's loss. He scored four superb tries, and never made a faux pas, in attack or defence. Strangely enough, his opposite number, Ian Moir, was again left out in the cold, the ball only coming to him twice all day. Once he cut holes in the defence, the other time his opponents nabbed him before he got the ball. Arthur Summons, making his debut in League football, displayed the hallmark of class, with a brilliant and versatile game, during which he scored two fine individual tries. Harry Wells looked the goods every time he moved, while Joe Ryan was outstanding. Keith Holman has lost none of his guile though a bit slow with his reflexes at times. Doug Jones, who scored two fine tries, stood out. With a fine turn of speed and a safe pair of hands, John Dawson and Garry Russell had a great nuisance value in defence.... Kangaroo winger Ken Irvine yesterday staked a strong claim for selection in the first of this season's Rugby League representative teams. Irvine scored four tries for North Sydney, which lost 24-35 to Western Suburbs. Irvine's four tries in a beaten side was a remarkable effort. Irvine now is the leading try-scorer for the season. He has scored nine tries in six matches, five of which North Sydney has lost. ... The teams scored 13 tries between them. ... With the exception of West lock Doug Jones' two tries, backs scored all the points. The success of the open play tactics pleased officials of both clubs... Although both teams attacked brilliantly, they failed badly in defence, Good tackling was rare. This spoilt an otherwise excellent match. Wests recovered quickly from an early lead Norths set up when Irvine scored. It hit back with a try by lock Doug Jones. At half-time Wests led 20-11. Wests did not look like losing its lead in the second half. But Norths would not give up. It matched Wests' three second-half tries. Brian Carlson (North) kicked three goals from nine attempts. Darcy Russell (Wests) landed seven goals from nine attempts. Five-eighth Arthur Summons had an impressive debut with Wests' first grade team. Norths' centre Paul Cuneo yesterday was prepared to make his openings and then pass to his outside-centre. Previously, he ran too far. Hooker Norm Strong gave North a 23-12 share of the scrums. But Wests overcame this with its strong work in the rucks. Referee Cliff Brown kept the game moving well. He awarded nine penalties to West and eight to North. (Sunday Telegraph 8th May 1960)

Notes: Despite Ken Irvine scoring four tries, Wests were able to prevail in a fast, open game. The previous week's injuries took their toll with replacements for Dimond (Bernie Kelly), O'Shea (Garry Russell debut), Carson (John Conna) and Buttenshaw (the great Arthur Summons making his debut). Arthur Summons showcased his great low tackling and his fast, elusive running while Harry Wells was back to his best. Doug Jones again led the forward charges.
