Easts' coach Russell Fairfax was relieved to grab the two competition points but uncomfortable about how they won in yesterday's 12-10 win over Wests. "It was embarrassing how poorly we played," Fairfax said. "They're not coached to play like that. However, we're badly in need of a win and two points is two points. ... Apart from the two competition points, the next two most important points of the match were two field goals from five-eighth Tony Melrose. Melrose's first field goal extended Easts' 8-4 half-time lead to 9-4 one minute into the second half. His second came in the final three minutes and made Easts' margin more comfortable. ... For the rest of this bright and often exciting clash it was the Great Britain Test stars on either side who were the spotlight. Wests' Ellery Hanley helped set up his team's first try for winger Graham Mackay and Garry Schofield scored the second. In Easts' side, it was the evasive Martin Offiah who scored the team's only try and Joe Lydon who kicked three goals – the last six minutes from full-time to regain the lead 11-10. ... Schofield, who only arrived in Australia on Saturday, came on as a second-half replacement. He immediately settled into place, assuming the role that has made him such a star with Great Britain and with Balmain in previous years. "There was a bit of inexperience out there today with Wests," Schofield said. "But that's why we're here to help show some of the younger players." For Wests' coach John Bailey the result was another near-miss after a 10-8 defeat by competition leaders Brisbane earlier in the season. "We just made too many mistakes," Bailey said. "I tell them time and time again. Today our kicking let us down. It was very, very poor. I did think we had Easts today in the second half." Bailey was entitled to think his side had the game in the bag when the team fought back from 6-0 down (17 mins) to trail 6-4 at half-time and lead 10-9 after Schofield's try in the 63rd minute. A mistake from the otherwise impressive full-back Brett Docherty, who ran behind team-mates and conceded a penalty for a shepherd, sealed the match. With six minutes to go, Joe Lydon calmly potted the penalty goal that put Easts ahead 11-10. ... (Daily Telegraph 22nd May 1989)

Notes: Garry Schofield made his second-half debut after arriving from England the previous day. Ellery Hanley moved to five-eighth and was quite influential. Although there was a high mistake rate, it was an entertaining, closely-contested game. It was Wests very ineffective kicking game that eventually proved the difference, as well as Graham Mackay missing all four shots at goal. Kelvin Skerrett finished with a possible broken fibula, while Teitzel, Cameron Blair and Tuuta were the best for Wests.
