

Possession-starved Newtown yesterday out-generalled Western Suburbs at Lidcombe Oval but still failed to end their 10-week premiership drought. Paul Broughton's big-hearted Jets took the try-scoring honours but went down 19-18 in a rib-tickling finish. A penalty caning from referee John Gocher and a 7-10 scrum loss most certainly cost Newtown their second win of the season. Newtown, who claimed the Magpies as their only scalp, produced a stylish brand of attacking play to notch four tries to Wests' three. Only the boot of winger Peter Rowles – five goals from eight shots – got Wests home. Referee Gocher's penalty count went against Newtown 6-1 in the first half and 13-5 overall. The Jets' first penalty came after 35 minutes play, but they still held the lead 10-5 at the break, and it could well have been more. A rare first-half defensive lapse let Wests strike back after 30 minutes, with Geoff Foster bullocking his way through four tackles to score. Wests opened the second half scoring with a penalty goal by Rowles, and drove home their possession advantage with tries to Donnelly (8 minutes) and Giteau (17 minutes). Another Rowles' goal had Wests 19-10 clear after 20 minutes, but the Jets fought back magnificently. Hooker Geoff Edwards rounded off a great day in the open by sending captain Col Casey over to bridge the gap to 19-13 with 14 minutes left. Minutes later Newtown were in again after one of their three second-half wins. Half Paul Hayward drew the defence and lock Ron Pilon did the rest. Newtown's forward work-horses again carried a huge load, with Fred Pagano (club record 55 tackles), Terry Elford, Casey, Bruce Gibbs and Edwards tackling themselves to a standstill. Even Wests rated Newtown unlucky not to win their one-point thriller at Lidcombe yesterday. Wests 19-18 win disproved the adage "the better team won." Wests skipper Tom Raudonikis said: "They made us look very bad out there; they broke us up easily." "Newtown were in our quarter only twice in the second half and they scored both times. They were a good thing beaten but, that's football." Newtown, with little possession, led 10-5 at the break; hard to believe because the Magpies had all the ball – penalty count 6-1, scrums 2-1. But in the 20 minutes after the break the Magpies had shot to a 19-10 lead. Their big forwards, Foster, Donnelly (until he ran out of steam) and Blyth forced Newtown into submission. Foster, his hard-running a feature, pushed off five would-be tacklers to score his team's first try. Newtown's best was hooker Geoff Edwards who had a fine game in the open. Sigsworth, Elford and Floyd also showed out. Keith Holman was subdued: "We got two points but, but I only wish my blokes had their heart." The Jets tackled all day – they made 276 all told. Fred Pagano made an unbelievable 53 tackles for the match. (The Sun 6th June 1977)

Notes: Wests were lucky to win a closely contested match. Newtown, lacking possession, tackled themselves to a standstill, with Fred Pagano making an outstanding 55 tackles. Doug Lucas was strong up front for Wests and Geoff Foster had a powerful hard-running display. Wests benefited from the return of Tom Raudonikis and Don Moseley.
