It's lucky Tom Raudonikis is a positive sort of bloke, otherwise he could be forgiven for being a bit concerned about the Magpies' form yesterday. Not that they played poorly in beating Gold Coast 26-10 - four tries to two - at Carrara Stadium to lift themselves into the top seven. It's more they did so at the end of a week in which they hardly saw their coach, who was on duty with the New South Wales State of Origin side. As Raudonikis himself pointed out: "When I was away with the Country side, they got up and beat Manly. They play pretty good when I'm away." After the match, Raudonikis asked his players to give reserve grade coach Jason Alchin, who paired with skipper Paul Langmack to prepare the side, a round of applause. The Magpies have lost just once since Raudonikis made his top-flight representative coaching debut on April 25. The only blight on a tradesman-like Wests' victory, which came after a 14-6 halftime lead, was a hamstring injury to Brandon Pearson. It may keep him on the sideline for longer than a month. Wests did what they had to do in the first half, watch the Chargers draw within four points, and then pounced on the home side's errors to seal victory with late tries to replacements Shane Miller and Des Hasler. The victory allowed them to leapfrog Gold Coast and Illawarra into equal 5th spot. It also avenged the Chargers 24-16 first round win at Campbelltown Sports Ground. While Raudonikis savoured his beer and cigarette and caught up with friends from his Logan City Brothers, Brisbane Norths and Ipswich days, Gold Coast coach Phil Economidis provided some of the most cutting comments from a losing coach this season. The best came when he was asked if there were any positives out of his team's performance, aside from the efforts of winger Marcus Bai and fullback Andrew King. "I'm just positive a few blokes might not be in the side next time we play," said Economidis, who described the performance as "embarrassing". **(Sydney Morning Herald 25th May 1997)**

Notes: The old heads of Des Hasler and Paul Langmack were again instrumental in carving out a Wests' win, with Langmack again setting up two tries. Andrew Leeds was safe as houses at the back in very difficult conditions. Late tries to Hasler and Millard sealed the victory, with the only issue a re-occurring hamstring injury to Brandon Pearson in the early minutes of the match.
