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A thirteen-week struggle to regain last year's form may have ended and Manly's problems may just be starting. That was the aftermath of Wests 18-0 shut-out of Manly in Round 13 at Lidcombe Oval yesterday. Those who saw the match left the ground convinced Wests were back in the premiership race, something that never really looked possible. From the first minute, when full-back John Dorahy took the game into his own hands, setting up John Donnelly's try, Wests were never in danger. Dorahy was again the outstanding player in the match. Manly's classy full-back Graham Eadie didn't have the same luck. He finished in hospital with torn ligaments and may be out for a month. He injured his left knee eight minutes after half-time and when he went off, so did Manly's greatest source of attack. They were co-competition leaders with Easts until yesterday, but there is certain to be a shake-up after the lethargic effort. Although they played without Bob Fulton and Terry Randall, they still had enough class players to test Wests. Yet it was rare the times they were able to breach Wests' defence. In the last four seasons Manly have failed to score three times – yesterday, against Parramatta (10-0) in 1973 and against St George at Kogarah (18-0) in 1972. All matches were played on a wet or heavy ground. And Manly's play fell away yesterday as the rain became heavier. All Wests' forwards played well. Pat Hundy has improved tremendously in the past month and Jim Murphy and Geoff Foster had fine games in the second-row. But it's no coincidence that captain Tommy Raudonikis had a good game. When he is going well, Wests go well. Wests scored their tries in the 2nd (Donnelly), 52nd (Dorahy), 57th (Foster) and 63rd (Mullins) minutes. For coach Don Parish, the win was like the start of a "new era." "We've been trying to do that for some time. I think we can make the finals now," he said. .. **(The Sun 16th June 1975)** 

**Notes:** Tom Raudonikis again demonstrated his class in this game. He backed up from the Australia/Wales Test the day before (Fulton didn't) and produced his best game of the year. Played in heavy rain, Wests were never in doubt after John Donnelly scored a try after one minute, following a brilliant Dorahy break. The Dorahy/Eadie matchup was a fizzer as Dorahy scored a try and kicked three goals to increase his lead to 13 in the point-scoring contest. He made many incisive breaks into the backline and was greatly helped by Donnelly's forward dominance and Raudonikis' control around the scrum base.

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
