Wests must make the semis if they hold yesterday's bustling form which gave them a 22-14 win over Saints at Lidcombe. Wests came through the hard game unscathed and ready for next Sunday's clash with Newtown at Henson Park. The Magpies were well led by Tommy Raudonikis yesterday but owed their win more to team work than individual brilliance. Saints did not look scoring a try off their own efforts against a swarming defence. Winger Paul Mills landed the two Dragon tries by gathering long Magpie passes which went astray after Wests looked like scoring when well inside Saints' 25. Barry Hulbert converted both Mills' tries so that without them it would have been a real hiding for Saints. Graeme Langlands was below his best form early and possibly was being troubled by his old rib injury even before he suffered a bruised thigh. With 10 minutes to go and the match long since gone, Langlands limped off, to be replaced by forward Denis Corrigan, with Ted Goodwin going to full-back. John Dorahy played well at full-back for Wests and several of his five goals were good efforts. Wests now need a win over Newtown to consolidate a place in the five and to build up their Cricket Ground game against Easts two rounds hence. (The Sun 15th July 1974)

Livewire Western Suburbs yesterday grabbed a fingertip hold on the rugby League final five at the expense of long-time rivals St George. Wests sneaked into equal fifth spot on the strength of their 22-14 win over Saints at Lidcombe Oval. For St George, the loss, before 11,986 spectators, almost certainly marked the end of an era. Unless a miracle happens the Saints – after 23 successive years in the semi-finals – won't make it this year. They are now three points behind the fifth teams – and just don't have the players any more to pick themselves up from there. ... Yesterday the young Wests team had a real final five look about them as they dealt most effectively with Saints. They scored four tries to two – and both Saints' touchdowns came against the run of play. The win brought a special smile to the face of Wests' coach Don Parish. Parish still remembers too well the beatings the top-class Wests teams of the early 'sixties used to take from the St George "invincibles". Yesterday, Wests' combination of big, youthful forwards and snappy backs was far too much for St George to handle. Wests outplayed Saints in the forwards – where the youngsters Hundy, Liubinskas and Myers again had big days. All the tries were good ones, featuring slick passes and strong, straight running. In contrast, ... (Daily Telegraph 15th July 1974)

**Notes:** This had a very torrid first half clash where Wests' young forwards, led by Hundy, Myers and Liubinskas, gradually got on top of the St George pack. This allowed Raudonikis and Dorahy to again have very dominant games. Wests were always in control and also tackled well. Both of St George's tries were scored off dropped passes. Russell Worth also had his best game so far for Wests. Don Parish didn't really have any sympathy for the fact that the loss meant St George would miss the semi-finals for the first time in 23 years.
