Wests have been a disappointing team but if their forward pack could have worked as it did yesterday then they could have been way up in the five. Without regulars Mick Liubinskas, Doug Lucas, Graham O'Grady) not forgetting Tom Raudonikis at half-back), the forward pack tore into Canterbury with more gusto than in most of their other matches. The tackling was outstanding and the Wests' pack forced Canterbury into many errors. Replacement prop Pat Hundy and the other prop John Donnelly had top games and they were well supported by the other members of the pack.
