Great Britain Test star Joe Lydon lifted a lethargic Eastern Suburbs to a 15-6 victory over Western Suburbs at Henson Park yesterday with two slashing second-half tries. Easts looked to be in real trouble, trailing 6-4 before Lydon finished off a backline movement to score in the 62nd minute, diving over in the corner. Shortly afterwards, the Rooster speed machine bolted away on a 70-metre dash to the line to put the issue beyond doubt. But after the match, Lydon said he was a little frustrated playing on the wing at Easts where he only got two or three chances yesterday. "My favourite position is in the centres, but Arthur Beetson wants me on the wing," Lydon said in the dressing room. "I prefer it closer to the action but I suppose I'm happy while I'm scoring tries. It was a great feeling to score two today." Coach Beetson said he had no thoughts of moving the classy Great Britain star into the centre position. "Are you calling me a dummy?" Beetson asked a reporter who suggested the positional switch to the centres. "I've got him on the wing where he's got more room to move. Also, the defence isn't as tight on the wing as it is in the centres." Eastern Suburbs were dreadful in the previous match against Penrith and yesterday's performance was not much better. At half-time they led 4-nil after possibly their worst 40 minutes of football all season. Wests grabbed the lead early in the second half with a try to centre John Allanson and it appeared as though an upset was on the cards. But Lydon struck to get the Roosters home. Beetson was naturally pleased to get the two points to remain in outright second position on the premiership ladder. However, it will take a huge improvement if they are to get anywhere the top sides like Manly. On the plus side, five-eighth Brendon Hall turned in another excellent display and second-rower Steve Hardy tried his hardest in the forwards. "I thought Hall was just about our best player," Beetson said. "He's an excellent five-eighth and a consistent type who plays well every week." Easts lost John Tobin with a knee injury in the second half, but the veteran forward is confident he will make it on to the field for next weekend's clash with Parramatta. Fullback Garry Wurth was also replaced with a corked thigh, but he too should be right to play against Easts. In the Wests' dressing room, Steve Ghosn was terribly disappointed. "I think we tried our hardest and gave it everything, but once more there were just too many errors," he said. "We gave Easts enough ball for them to win 20 games of football."
