South Sydney coach-elect Bob McCarthy must have wondered yesterday why he accepted the Rabbitohs' coaching position for next season. McCarthy sat under the main grandstand at Campbelltown to watch an undisciplined Souths side receive a 32-10 thumping from Western Suburbs. The Rabbitohs looked lethargic and uninterested as they struggled to overcome a Wests' side which displayed touches of class. It was evident yesterday that the horde of South Sydney players leaving the club next season were looking to the future. McCarthy's first job must be to put some pride and desire into the Redfern club. He will have to produce a magic act if he is to guide Souths back into semi-final contention in 1994. "It was a very disappointing effort," said current coach Frank Curry. "I think the players thought they would simply go through the formalities to chalk up their third successive win. "Stephen Kearney, who played President's Cup last year was the most experienced player we had in the forwards today," Ryan said. Wests' most experienced forward Paul Langmack said the blending of youth and experience pointed to a rip-roaring 1994. "We blooded a few youngsters today, "Langmack said. "At least during the off-season, they will know what it takes to play first grade. There are some top young players in the club. Add them to our new buys - Dale Fritz, Darren Brown, Jim Serdaris and Matt Wood - and 1994 is looking good. I know we'll be right up there again next year."
