It was quite a day for Michael Cronin, the unassuming pub owner from Gerringong who likes to take life as it comes. Cronin was almost back to his best in Parramatta's 24-7 win over Western Suburbs at Belmore Sports Ground yesterday. He broke a club try-scoring record held by someone he knew nothing about. He kicked four goals from six attempts. Best of all, he was running just like he used to as a young lad in the bush competition all those years ago. But typically, Cronin – the gentleman of Rugby League as he is known – was not overly impressed with his display before 16,444 supporters. "Yeah, mate. I played all right, but you need more than just one game to prove that you're going well," he said. "When you have been playing as ordinary as I have, naturally you are worried." Cronin, 30, scored a try in the 28th minute of the first half to bring his tally with the club to 59 - one ahead of Mitchell Wallace, who scored 58 between 1949 and 1952. "Ooh, the Crow of old!" sighed Parramatta's secretary, Denis Fitzgerald, from the grandstand. Cronin's dramatically improved play was just one of a number of aspects that pleased coach Jack Gibson. In short, the Parramatta players aided, rather than hampered, each other. It was a far from different team from the one so comprehensively beaten by Manly-Warringah in the KB Cup last Wednesday. Slightly-built Paul Taylor, who filled in for Peter Sterling in the half-back spot, was outstanding. Taylor may lack something in attack, but his amazing work-rate makes him very much a Jack Gibson-type player. He made 45 tackles yesterday, and he also featured when Parramatta had the ball, scoring two tries. .... Western Suburbs, without lock Jim Leis, were not the slightest bit impressive. Unimaginative forward play and weak defence were rife. Coach Terry Fearnley's rhetorical question aptly described the game: "They were too good for us, weren't they?" The defeat was, in fact, the first time a Fearnleycoached side has lost to a Gibson-coached side in eight matches, or six years of coaching. "I'll retire before Gibson has a chance to catch up," Fearnley grinned. Wests looked good enough in the opening minutes of the match to suggest they would stretch Parramatta. They led 2-0 after 15 minutes after a Greg Cox penalty goal. But the Eels went ahead 5-2 10 minutes later through a surprising try by Taylor. Second-rower Chris Phelan, not normally noted for his ball skills, slipped a superb pass to Taylor 5m from the line. ... (Sydney Morning Herald 9th August 1982)
