Tom Raudonikis was climbing the SFS stairs when Souths scored their opening try 60 seconds into their clash with Wests. But for Souths' next five tries, the Wests' coach wasn't so lucky. Raudonikis could do nothing more than sit in the grandstand yelling abuse into his walkie talkie, as the Rabbitohs racked up their biggest win in recent memory. "We started dreadfully," he confessed. "The first try was so quick I didn't even see it. It was a poor start and we've got no excuses... there's a hell of a lot of work to do." ... South were red-hot, albeit against the depleted Wests' side. Their forwards ran roughshod over the Wests' pack in a manner that would have delighted Sattler. Out wide, the backs cut loose with some sparkling play and Julian O'Neill completed the rout by banging over goals from all angles. It was close to a complete performance, and one that left Rabbitoh coach Steve Martin searching for answers. "It was frustrating because we haven't done that every week," Martin said. "The boys showed what can be done when they play for the 80 minutes. Had we beaten Cronulla, which we should have, we would be three and three and right up there." The match was effectively over at half time with Souths ahead 26-0, and the only interest of the crowd was who would win a car in a raffle drawn at half time. The car was won by a little old lady, and even she was given a standing ovation by the pro-Souths crowd. After the break, Souths eased up, with honours even at two tries apiece in the second session. For the long suffering Raudonikis, that at least was something to salvage from the wreck. "I asked them at half time not to throw the towel in and I think they picked up their act," he said. "We are still confident about our chances for the season and believe we can beat anyone on any given day." ... Trindall's opposite, the enigmatic Leo Dynevor, was clearly out of his depth and has struggled to show the class that won him a lucrative contract with the club. Hooker Geordi Peats showed plenty of guile and Terry Hermanson celebrated his late call-up to the Kiwi squad with a strong game. (The Daily Telegraph 20th April 1998)

Notes: This was a huge turnaround from the Round 3 result but it emphasised the extent of the injury toll. Langmack, Mescia and Harvey Howard were out pre-match and Georgallis and Skandalis both left the field early, badly injured. This forced debuts from Leo Clarke, Ben MacDougall and also Lincoln Raudonikis and an unknown, Nick Edwards, as replacements. Souths scored after one minute and Wests were always on the back foot. They couldn't hold the Souths' forwards and Leo Dynevor was clearly outplayed by Darren Trindall.
