Wests' coach Warren Ryan suffered a nasty attack of the deja vus for 10 minutes at Parramatta Stadium yesterday. Coasting 22-2 at half-time, the Magpies got a jolt when Parramatta punched in two tries to make it 22-12 early in the second half. At that stage, Ryan's mind clicked back two weeks - to a 14-0 lead squandered against St George, who went on to win 20-18. But Wests quickly put their coach back into relaxation mode when they flattened the Eels in the final quarter. The last 22 minutes brought 25 points – a devastating finale which humbled Parramatta and left the scoreboard at an embarrassing 47-12. ... It was a shattering victory by the Magpies. Their young turks scored their points, but it was bunch of flint-hard journeymen forwards who laid the foundations. The pack of Tony Rampling, Joe Thomas, David Gillespie and Graeme Wynn, Jason Lidden and Ron Gibbs gathered at Campbelltown from all points of the compass. Bruising in the tradition of Ryancoached teams, they trampled Parramatta in the latter stages. Heading the charge was the well-travelled Tony Rampling, back from a bush campaign in 1990 – and looking as formidable as he was when he played first grade in Sydney – with Souths, back in 1981. It was an impressive flexing of muscles as Wests start to make their presence felt this premiership season after a slowish start. Half-back Jason Taylor kicked brilliantly to build on the seven tries scored, and 20-year-old winger Stephen Burns, who joined Wests via Penrith and Illawarra, scored three of the touchdowns with excellent finishing. Taylor kicked nine goals from 10 attempts: his one miss was a sideline conversion shot, and he has now landed 18 goals from 21 attempts in his last three games. ... The first Wests' try (Andrew Farrar, 11 minutes), came off a pass which was heading a long way forward before a Parramatta hand flicked it. Referee Geoff Week's decision to rule play-on looked questionable. Wests built on that try with two to winger Burns, off props Rampling and Gillespie. The Eels' hope of a glorious recovery quickly evaporated. Jamie Ainscough scored a try, Taylor kicked a couple of goals and Farrar a field goal – and then the floodgates really opened. The last 10 minutes were devastating for Parramatta as Burns and replacement forward Jim Dymock (2) galloped in for tries. "We've got to keep working - and try to turn it around. There's nothing else we can do," Cronin said afterwards. Last on the ladder and yet to break their premiership duck, Parramatta face up to high-flyers Manly next Sunday. Wests meet Brisbane on Friday night. (Sydney Morning Herald 22nd April 1991)

Notes: Wests finally realised their potential and blitzed Parramatta in the second half, scoring 25 points in the last 20 minutes. The forward pack was completely on top at that stage and the backs, particularly winger Stephen Burns, reaped the rewards. Tony Rampling had a very strong game, rolling back the years to his Souths' heyday. Jason Taylor continued his stellar gaol-kicking with nine out of ten, some from the sideline.

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
