

## **Match Description**

Western Suburbs, probably the most enthusiastic team in Sydney, yesterday beat St George 23-13 at Lidcombe Oval, but were not happy with their form. The Western Suburbs players felt after the game they had dominated for all but a few minutes that they should have won by more points. Their skipper Tom Raudonikis said the performance was one of his team's worst of the season, and that doesn't say much for St George. Wests scored five tries to three in a game they tried to confine almost entirely to the forwards. Four of Wests' tries came from their pack, with Les Boyd and John Donnelly the only forwards not to touch down. Their tactics were fair enough, as the St George six simply could not hold their opponents in defence and could make little headway in attack. The solidly-built "kid from Cootamundra" Les Boyd was a dominant figure in the Western Suburbs forwards, continually worrying the life out of the St George defence pack. But the outstanding player was Western Suburbs winger Russell Mullins. If Western Suburbs are an enthusiastic side, then it is Mullins who is the super-enthusiast among them, and yet amazingly has not played representative football. He was everywhere yesterday, tackling strongly, taking high kicks, running the ball up and even taking the first pass off the rucks. He never failed to gain ground as he hurled his bony frame at St George players, who obviously did not fancy the task of bringing him down. Apart from Mullins and Boyd, Western Suburbs were best served by prop John Donnelly, Raudonikis and five-eighth Graeme O'Grady. O'Grady made a couple of long breaks as well as defending stoutly until replaced ten minutes from the end with an injured thumb. St George certainly have their problems. They were never in the game and this could be their most bleak winter for many seasons. They desperately need their main attacking forces, Ted Goodwin and Rod Reddy, back on the field, yet neither will be playing next week. In the meantime, the Saints will have to make do with a team that has difficulty making a break. Yesterday, veteran centre Roy Ferguson was their outstanding player and in fact was extremely close to being the Telegraph's Man of the Match. Ferguson took the advice of his captain-coach Graeme Langlands and ran hard on to the ball rather than attempting to dance his way around the opposition. The move worked wonders and Ferguson was the only St George player to cause Western Suburbs any real problems. He scored one try and played a prominent part in another try scored by Robert Finch. Bruce Starkey contributed the only fire in the St George pack. (Daily Telegraph 26th April 1976)

**Notes:** Tom Raudonikis thought this was their worst performance of the year but Wests were backing up from a mid-week Amco Cup win, where John Elford had broken an arm, so it was still a good effort. Geoff Foster had his best game of the season and was ably backed up by Boyd and Raudonikis. The forwards kept pouring through gaps up the middle, allowing the backs to have strong games, especially Robbie Parker.

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
