For a late arrival on the Sydney first-grade Rugby League scene, Steve Hanson, the strapping 23-year-old North Sydney front-rower, is making up spectacularly for lost time. Two bumping runs for tries in the space of four minutes at North Sydney yesterday guaranteed North Sydney a safe margin to keep the battling Western Suburbs at bay. Norths won 22-20 but Wests almost broke free of the bear hug in the closing moments when they set up a storming attack on the North Sydney goal-line. For Norths it was a win that gives them just a little more respectability on the competition table; for Wests it was a loss that makes the 1985 wooden spoon more of a reality. On a sponge-topped ground, Steve Hanson stood out among two sets of willing forwards. A total of 17 tackles topped the North Sydney count and some of them were bone-crushers, too. Yet this was just his sixth first-grade appearance. Indeed, this time last year he was running around in the colours of McMahon's Point in the Norths' Juniors. ..... Hawick said he was just happy to get the two competition points and Norths, he thought, had played well enough. And they had been inconvenienced by the loss of centre Neigel Tait with a rib cartilage injury midway through the first half. Norths are nothing if not unpredictable. In dry conditions they can play dull and defensively but yesterday in challenging conditions they spun a wet ball about in cup-final style. Mitchell Cox's return to the backline has given Norths new impetus and, as the pivot between Paul McCaffery and Lyons, he was responsible for some clever attacking play and was solid in defence, too, with 16 tackles. The rugged Lyons pulled off 19 tackles. Wests set out to test fullback John O'Toole, but he handled pressure kicks coolly and had the last word when he scored Norths' winning try. Lightweight halves Trevor Cogger and Michael Neil performed the best for Wests and fullback John McArthur got through some tigerish tackling. Skipper Terry Leabeater, hooker Alan Fallah and bulky prop Bruce Clark teamed up in a front row that won the scrums 15-10 and made their presence felt in general play. But enthusiasm cannot hide Wests' painful deficiencies in class. Thanks to a High Court life-boat, Wests survived to stay in this year's competition. It is a tribute to the club that there is so much enthusiasm and true grit displayed by the players. (Sydney Morning Herald 6th May 1985)

Notes: Down 18-4 on a boggy field, Wests stormed back to nearly win on the bell. They were pounding the North Sydney line as the final siren sounded. Chris Stephandellis made a comeback after a broken jaw, scored a good try, and went close to a match-winning try near the end. Early defensive lapses let them down badly but losing Alan Geelan early to injury didn't help. Alan Fallah was again impressive.
