Brown and Martin showed speed for Wests and McGuinness served snappily from the scrums. Lucas and Grew were the pick of the forwards. (Truth 19th July 1942)

North Sydney's captain and brilliant centre, Frank Hyde, may not play again this season. He was tackled heavily soon after half-time at North Sydney Oval yesterday in the League match against Western Suburbs. He was taken to hospital with a recurrence of a shoulder injury. Norths also were without their brilliant halves, Thompson and Harrison. Although Wests won 14-12, it was no fault of F. Cottle, North Sydney fullback. His display was worthy of an International. Kicking brilliantly and setting his backs moving, he gave his side many scoring opportunities. Wests played inspired football. Their handling and positional play could not be faulted. Hooker Grew gave Wests a feast of the ball. McGuiness (half) never failed to take the advantage. Wests also fielded L. Rigby, who had placed with the thirds. Until yesterday he played with the Western District President's Cup team. He made few errors, proving a good substitute for Keato. **(The Daily Telegraph 19th July 1942)**

**Notes:** Wests were back into the winning list with a hard-fought battle. Les Rigby, recently out of President's Cup, played Thirds at full-back and then backed up in Firsts, and played well. Thomas Grew and Ted Edwards also made debuts. Frank Hyde, the best Norths' player was taken to hospital but Wests were leading 11-2 at that stage and had to withstand a strong Norths' finish. Goal-kicking was also still a significant problem.
