Weary Canterbury half-back Steve Mortimer limped off Belmore Sports Ground a hero yesterday, having steered the Bulldogs home 18-10 against an enthusiastic Western Suburbs to complete one of his most satisfying weekends in rugby league. Mortimer, named last night as the NSW half for next week's first State-of-Origin match, after outpointing Peter Sterling in the Sydney-Country clash on Saturday, saved plenty of cunning for the hapless Magpies. Backing up, along with six other Canterbury players after the representative matches, Mortimer took his usual control of the Bulldogs' attack and showed great judgement to score after 24 minutes. After a passing burst saw centre Greg Mullane cross Wests' quarter-line with the defence closing, Mortimer pointed ahead for this team-mate to kick and then zoomed in. The little half collected a neat bounce to score. After fullback Mick Potter's 39th-minute try sent Canterbury to the break 14-0 up, it appeared Wests would be hard-pressed to keep the score down. But a concerted second half defensive effort, led by lock Mark Harrigan, who took Canterbury's Geoff Robinson head-on half-a-dozen times among his 46 tackles, and two tries put Wests back in touch after 55 minutes. Vital penalties to Canterbury in the 64th and 71st minutes, both converted by winger Ross Conlon, eventually held the Magpies at bay – and ignited their coach Ken Gentle's temper. Gentle was fuming over referee Martin Weekes' performance, describing it as the worst he had seen in 16 years of coaching. "Every time he got us, it was well within kicking range for Conlon," he said. Mortimer was replaced 10 minutes from full-time with a damaged calf muscle, but had no doubt he would be fit for Wednesday night's National Panasonic Cup game against Manly. .... With the game delicately poised at 14-10, the Magpies conceded penalties, two of which Ross Conlon converted. That gave the Bulldogs a breathing space and ultimate victory. The Magpies again showed plenty of character and did their coach proud with their whole-hearted and enterprising second-half effort. Among their key players was lock Mark Harrigan, who showed there is no substitute for courage when he bounced back after two heavy knocks and figured in Broughton's try – and made an extraordinary 45 tackles. Prop John Coveney (35 tackles) revelled in the conditions against his former club, while full-back Leo Epifania showed a great deal of spark in attack. (Daily Telegraph 21st May 1984)

Notes: Wests were down 14-0 at half-time but gallantly fought their way back 14-10, on the back of a Steve Broughton 70 metre try which was regarded as the best of the round. At that point Canterbury were given two penalties in front of the posts and Conlon put them safely in front, much to the frustration of coach Gentles, who rated the performance of referee Martin Weekes one of the worst he'd ever seen. Steve Kerr, a \$10 buy from Ryde-Eastwood, had an impressive debut, but it was a powerhouse performance by lock Mark Harrigan which inspired the comeback.
