A lionhearted Western Suburbs Rugby League team, playing a man short for more than three quarters of the match, yesterday kept their premiership chances flickering with a grim victory over Balmain. Wests defeated Balmain 12-7 at Sydney Sports Ground. Wests win puts them equal with Newtown in fourth place in the premiership. Wests and Newtown will meet in a play-off for fourth spot in the semi-finals. ... In yesterday's match referee Bill Kelly ordered Wests' Captain-Coach Noel Kelly from the field 18 minutes after the start. Noel Kelly will appear before the NSW Judiciary committee tonight on a charge of deliberate punching. Wests' win, without star Test prop Kelly for most of the match, was full of merit. Wests' 12 men outplayed Balmain's 13 in every department. ... Balmain were very shoddy yesterday. Adding to their misfortunes, they lost winger Hal Brown for the remainder of the season. Browne dislocated his shoulder in the closing stages of the game. ... Wests dominated possession yesterday with a great exhibition of handling and a 12-6 margin in the scrums. With Wests having only a five-man pack for most of the match, it was obvious that Balmain missed the services of hooker Dick Wilson. ...Two snap tries for Wests within a space of two minutes in the first half put the skids under Balmain. Lock Barry Bryant dashed around a ruck and stepped inside the defence in a weaving run to score the first try. Test centre Peter Dimond snapped up the second try six minutes before half-time when he took an intercept from Balmain Test forward Arthur Beetson to go over in the same position. Wests led 10-2 at half-time. Wests had command for most of the second half. (Daily Telegraph 22nd August 1966)

Notes: In a remarkable performance, Wests had won their last four matches against Easts, Newtown (1st), St George and now Balmain (2nd) to qualify for a play-off for fourth against Newtown on the Tuesday. In a year where Wests had lost up to half their team at times to injury it was, in fact, one of Wests' best efforts. This win was even more gritty, considering Noel Kelly was sent off after 18 minutes but the Wests pack, led by Denis Meaney and a resurgent Barry Bryant completely dominated the Balmain pack which included Arthur Beetson. Noel Thornton's dominance of the scrums 12-6 was also a major factor. Wests finished the match bruised and battered, with serious injury doubts about Jim Cody and John Elford. To back up two days later was a big task. This was a deferred match from Round 15, played as the last match in the premiership rounds.
