Don Parish kicked Western Suburbs to a surprise 16-14 win against Balmain at Lidcombe Oval yesterday. It was one of the most exciting games of the season. Parish kicked six goals and drop-kicked two goals to score all of Wests' points. This defeat could cost Balmain a position in the semi-finals because they play South Sydney in the final round next weekend. Wests deserved their win although they did not score a try. Balmain gained an early lead when Len Killeen crossed for a try and converted it. John Spencer scored Balmain's second try only minutes later and Wests appeared to be out of the match. But that was the end of Balmain's scoring spree. Wests burst back into the game with a series of chain-passing attacks that had Balmain continually on the defence. Parish reduced Balmain's eight-point lead with two fine goals — one from near half-way — and then drop-kicked a great field goal from 40 yards out. Shortly before half-time, Parish kicked another goal to make the score eight-all. After the interval, Dave Bolton replaced Balmain's brilliant half Sid Williams. In the second half, Wests hit the front for the first time when Parish kicked another goal. But Balmain replied with a goal from Killeen. With the scores tied at 12-all, Bolton kicked a field goal to put Balmain in front. As time was running out, Parish kicked his fifth goal to level the score. Two minutes before the end he won the match for Wests with a neat field goal — his second of the day. (Daily Telegraph 14th August 1967)

Parish reduced Balmain's eight-point lead with two fine goals – one from near half-way – and then drop-kicked a beautiful field goal from 40 yards out. Shortly before half-time Parish kicked another goal and the teams left the field at half-time with the score at eight-all. After the interval, Balmain's brilliant half Sid Williams was replaced by Dave Bolton. Immediately after the resumption, Wests hit the front for the first time when Parish kicked another goal but Balmain replied with a goal from Killeen and it was anybody's game. With the scores tied at 12-all, Bolton kicked a field goal to put Balmain in front. With time running out, Parish kicked his fifth goal to level the score, and two minutes before the end won the match for Wests with a neat field goal – his second of the day. For Wests, Denis Pittard, Parish, Bruce Beer and John Armstrong stood out. Keith Barnes, Killeen, Yow Yeh, Spencer and Beetson played well for Balmain. (Sydney Morning Herald 14th August 1967)

**Notes:** Wests scored an upset win due to the continuing outstanding goal-kicking form of Don Parish. Both his field goals were outstanding efforts. Pittard had a welcome return to form, finally shaking off the effects of his serious car accident and Bruce Beer, relishing his stint in first grade, along with John Armstrong, were both strong performers. Bob Smith made his debut, coming in for the injured Noel Kelly.

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
