..... developed his rugby league skills at Westmead and then Parramatta Marist Brothers. He played junior rugby league with Wentworthville in the mid 1960's but by 1967 he was graded with the Wentworthville senior team which dominated the Sydney Second Division at the time.

Wayne played in the 1968 Wentworthville Reserve Grade team which was coached by former Wests First grade player, George Lucas. The Reserve Grade team were premiers in 1968.


In 1970, the NSW Rugby League experimented by including the two top teams from the previous year's Second Division competition in the first division pre-season cup competition. The experiment only lasted the one season with Wentworthville winning one of its four matches. The team finished in 12th position ahead of Penrith and University. The team defeated Parramatta but lost a close match against University.

More importantly, Wentworthville played against Wests in that competition and while being soundly defeated it also provided the opportunity for Wests to have a close look at Wayne Merry.

Wests graded Wayne Merry from the Wentworthville Club and he was selected for the First Grade team to play Parramatta in round one of the 1970 season, replacing Roy Ferguson. It was an opportunity for Wayne but Roy returned the following week and maintained his First Grade position for most of the season. Wayne remained in Reserve Grade for the remainder of the season tallying up twenty games in Reserves that year.



Wayne Merry's debut with Wests

Wayne had his next opportunity to play First Grade in round six of the 1971 season when he came into the team to replace Dick Timbs who had influenza.

During his three seasons with Wests, Wayne Merry played seventeen First Grade, forty seven Reserve Grade, one Third Grade and one Endeavour Cup game. He scored twelve tries and kicked three goals for a tally of forty two points in all grades and cup matches.

Wayne Merry's Playing Record at Wests

Wayne joined up with the Penrith Club in 1973 and finished his career in the Sydney premiership that year. However Wayne was a serving member of the NSW Police and so he continued his rugby league interest with the NSW Police rugby league team.

An interesting story has been recorded from that tour. It was said that the tour was bitter/sweet for a number of players. Bitter, because the NSW/Queensland game never went ahead. Sweet, because the team were a great bunch of blokes and they had a fantastic time as mates.

A member of that team recalled;

"We got off the plane in Brisbane and were met by a Queensland cop, who told us they could not get a team together. He then drove us to the pub where we had been previously booked and we drank and played pool all afternoon.

Rod Bryant had recently won a share in a lottery and seemed to have plenty of money to throw around. He and Bugs Merry wanted to run a book on a pool competition. Bobby and I (Bob Capel), teamed together and were pretty hopeless.

However, the rest of the team all got together and put their money on us and we then won the tournament. We put Rod's money on the bar and continued to have a great afternoon. The following day we were all driven to the Kirra Beach Hotel where we spent another three days on the drink."


The NSW Police rugby league team did play some football in 1980. A 23 man contingent toured New Zealand in September of that year. They played two matches against combined New Zealand Police teams, the second of which at Auckland was for an annual shield. The New Zealanders proved a little too strong for the tourists, winning the decisive match 29-22.

The Police Force was not all football and good times for Wayne. He was a highly respected officer with the NSW Tactical Response Group (TRG). The TRG was created in 1982. There were four units in Sydney drawn from the ranks of general duties police. Their primary role was to respond to riots, demonstrations, disasters, saturation patrols and to support the SWOS team at barricaded hostage

and siege situations. The TRG and SWOS teams were amalgamated in the 1990's to form a full time Tactical Operations Unit.




Wayne Merry at work with the TRG

In many ways these police units were rudimentary in the way they were equipped and trained compared to their modern day counterparts. The photo of Wayne Merry above shows him wearing a general duties uniform, a basic military style helmet and perhaps some body armour.

During Wayne's time with the TRG, the unit was involved in one of the highest profile siege events. The Spit Bridge siege in Sydney's north was the culmination of a failed bank robbery and after taking hostages from the bank the perpetrator was cornered on the Spit Bridge. He was subsequently killed but not before severely wounding one of the detectives at the scene.

Wayne, who was a prolific song writer and musician, wrote a song about the event. In fact Wayne drew on his experiences in the NSW Police Force as inspiration for many of his songs.

Based in the inner city, he was exposed to the darker side of life on the streets and could see the human cost of addiction, homelessness and exploitation.



He performed with the band Redgum which had the iconic hit song, "I was only 19" which told the story of a young Australian soldier in Vietnam. Schumann was interested in the raw and real life stories in Wayne Merry's songs.

While Wayne was very much used to performing his many songs both in the studio and live on stage. It was also at the North Annadale Hotel that he stumbled into another form of artistry when he became an accidental extra in an iconic musical film clip.

The hotel at that time hosted its fair share of Country music artists, a genre that Wayne Merry was quite familiar with. The story goes that he was walking past the hotel when he saw a light inside which just happened to be a film crew setting up to film the interior scenes for the iconic clip of Cold Chisel's song, "Flame trees."

Wayne, of course was in his customary cowboy hat and no doubt looked the part, so was immediately roped in to give authenticity to the nostalgic theme of the song. He was cast as one of a number of old friends reminiscing over old times and forelorn love as the camera pans to a young couple standing by the pianola, with the unanswered question as to whether he will leave the town as so many others have done, or stay with his love.

HELL-raising retired Cold Chisel rockers - stars of the Star Hotel riot - have recruited an unusual video star.

The band, who immortalised the rock-ers-coppers bilitzkreig in song, hired a

real life anti-terrorist police officer. But the policeman, Senior Constable Wayne "Buggsle" Merry of the Tactical Response Group, doesn't play a cop. Buggsie, 34, plays a cowboy in a honky tonk scene in the video for the song Flame Trees from Cold Chisel's sixth

the video captures childhood memories of the writer. Don Walker. "I was just walking past when I saw a light in the window," ever-vigilant Buggle explained.

Mean dudes

"I was wearing my cowboy hat and they said: 'Step inside, you're just what we need.'

Buggsle soon found himself seated at a table with three other mean dudes male stripper, his sidekick and publican John Powell.


Wayne Merry died at Belfield, NSW in November 2022 after a battle with cancer. He was exposed to the darker side of life through his role in the Police Force but from the various interviews that he had given he appeared to be able to filter those darker moments through the realms of his music.

He was a loving family man and a good mate. The tributes at the time of his death attest to his laconic character and perhaps a bit of larrikin thrown in as well. Wayne attended every Pratten Park Magpies reunion and on his passing it was noted that he was not only a talented musician, but a mate to many.

In the notice of his death, his former Police colleagues noted that he was a loving dad, brother and mate. **"He is on his way to where there is no technology, stupid people, mobile phones, people that can't tackle but above all, no more pain."**

Perhaps the day that he walked into the North Annandale hotel and became a cast member in the "Flame Trees" film clip was more than an accident. The words from the song that align with Wayne's appearance would not be out of place in Wayne's life.

"But oh who needs that sentimental bullshit, anyway Takes more than just a memory to make me cry And I'm happy just to sit here (at) a table with old friends And see which one of us can tell the biggest lies"
