Jim remained with the Berala Bears in 1970 and along with future Wests team mates Trevor Reardon and Steve Blyth took all before them being undefeated in their age division.

However, Jim soon linked up with the powerful Concord United junior Club. Contemporaries of Jim at Concord included future First Grade players Mick Liubinskas and Steve Rigney. While playing with Concord, Jim was selected for the Wests Jersey Flegg Cup team in 1972 and was appointed as captain of the team.



The 1972 Jersey Flegg team went through the preliminary rounds undefeated and then met South Sydney in the Final. It was a tough match which spilled out with some feeling after the final siren. Trevor Reardon of Wests scored the only try of the match after good lead up work by Jim Myers. However Wests were effectively penalised out of the game with Souths points coming from seven goals and a field goal to take a 15-5 win.

Jim was clearly an influential player in the Jersey Flegg team. He was described in Wests 1972 Annual Report as follows;

"James Myers formerly played with the Berala Club but is now playing with Concord C Grade. Jim is a big fast boy with flawless cover defence and an uncanny ability to be in the right place at the right time. He was lock and captain of the Jersey Flegg team. I am sure that this boy has a great future in rugby league."

Jim was one of three players awarded an educational scholarship by Wests in 1972. The others were fifteen year old Peter Lema from the S G Ball team and the other player was Neil Bennett from the Jersey Flegg team and now Archivist at Wests Archive. Neil was young enough to go on and captain the Wests 1973 Jersey Flegg team.

In discussing this period with Jim, there was a back story which paints an interesting picture. Jim was educated at Christian Brothers Lewisham. The school has a proud history of nurturing rugby league players, many of whom have played for Wests.

The alumni also includes many who have gone on to occupy the most influential positions in rugby league. One of these was Canterbury Bankstown's Chief Executive and recruiter extraordinaire, Peter "Bullfrog" Moore. Peter, over a twenty five year period had brought many great players to the Canterbury club. However, on occasion one or two slipped through the net, much to the chagrin of Moore.

Jim Myers not only demonstrated his ability playing rugby league, but he also participated in pro running during the off season. Moore had been keeping an eye on him and as a result of Jim's performance in the Flegg team he was offered the opportunity, with a cash incentive, to trial with Canterbury. The weekend in question was a problem for Jim as he had a prior commitment to be in Coonabarabran in the central west of NSW.

Moore was not to be rebuffed and expressed his displeasure to Jim as there was nothing more important than Moore's Bulldogs. Canterbury was not the only Club interested in Jim, so when Wests awarded him an educational scholarship, it was an easy decision for a Wests tragic to remain with the Club. Ironically, Peter Moore was renowned for introducing scholarships to young up and coming players to make their transition into premiership rugby league that little bit easier. Jim Myers was one that got away.

Jim was graded with Wests in 1972 after he completed his Jersey Flegg duties. He played five Third Grade games at the back end of the season. He started the 1973 season in under 23's, moved up to Reserve Grade, and then in round twelve, he made his First Grade debut in a match against North Sydney when he was called on as a replacement for an injured Barry Bryant, late in the game.



With Barry Bryant still injured, Jim was selected in Wests First Grade run on team the following week against Parramatta.

The Wests Archive web site has recorded the action from that game;

Led by a fiery Jim Cody, the Wests' pack, with newcomers, Geoff Foster and Jim Myers, gave a ferocious tackling display to allow Wests to overcome a 5-7 deficit. In a very gruelling match with numerous forward clashes, especially with Bob O'Reilly and Cody and Foster, Wests sealed the match with a Ford penalty two minutes from the end. Raudonikis played his usual high quality game.

1974 was a good year for Wests with the First Grade team making the finals for the first time in a decade. It was a good year for Jim Myers. He played in the First Grade team in the Pre Season Cup competition then spent some time in Reserve Grade before making a return to First Grade mid-year.

Wests were seeing the benefit from a group of young juniors now making their way into First Grade. More than half of the 1974 First Grade squad were eligible to play in under 23's.

Jim was a replacement for the minor semi final against 1973 premiers, Manly Warringah. In a tense match Wests defeated the Manly side to end their season. Wests met Eastern Suburbs the following week to contest the preliminary final. Easts overcame Wests in the second half and went on to be 1974 premiers.

Jim's career as a teacher was developing and from 1975 until 1977 he spent much of his time playing in the Wests Reserve Grade and under 23's teams. Around this time he became involved with the Teachers Rugby League Club and coached them to some success in the University Cup competition.

By 1977, Jim's teaching job had him relocate to the NSW Central Coast. He played two Reserve Grade and five under 23's games with Wests that year.

The following year Jim played with the Ourimbah Magpies and in 1979 he joined the Erina Eagles where he remained until 1981. Erina Eagles won the Central Coast premiership in 1981.

Jim returned to Wests in 1982 and played six Third Grade games. He remained on the Central Coast but retired from playing. During his seven seasons at Wests, Jim played eighteen First Grade, forty six Reserve Grade, eleven Third Grade, thirty six Under 23's and two Pre Season Cup games for a total of one hundred and thirteen games in all grades.

He also scored seventeen tries and kicked twenty eight goals in all grades for a tally of one hundred and twenty four points.
